To whom it may concern:

I am responding to public Notice No. 781 which appeared in the vol., 58(184) of the Federal Register. It is my intent to express my support for the Lake Wisconsin Viticultural Area as put forth by Charles Dean on behalf of Wollersheim Winery.

It is no geographical fluke or mere historical footnote that has resulted in Wollersheim Winery being located where it is today. The site was originally chosen for viticulture by Baron Agoston Haraszthy, the father of the California wine industry, for good reason. The south facing limestone slopes of the viticultural area proposed receive the benefit of more direct sunlight in the critical periods of early Spring and late fall than do the surrounding slopes. They also receive reflected sunlight from the Wisconsin River during these times in a manner similar to the great properties along the Rhine, and the Cote D'or in Burgundy. Baron Haraszthy's efforts lacked only the hardier French-American grape varietals that are now available for success.

That the winery is a success today as a result of the efforts of the Wollersheim family has been known in the region for some time. I have friends who come from Minneapolis annually to visit the winery and purchase their yearly needs. One only has to look at the November, 1993 issue of Bon Appetit magazine, where the 1991 Domaine Reserve is one of the Top Ten wines of the month, to see that this reputation for quality is richly deserved.

I believe that the "Lake Wisconsin Viticultural Area" is a valid of the viticultural area concept. The area has a unique combination of soils, landscape position, and microclimate which make it particulary suited to the production of quality wine grapes. Many aspects of this "uniqueness" are shared by some of the greatest vineyards in Europe. The area also has a long and rich history of wine production. This history includes the great strides toward creating wines of quality and distinction that the Wollersheim's themselves have made in the past decade.

Please register my comments in favor of establishing Lake Wisconsin Viticultural Area.

To Whom it May Concern,

We are pleased to write to you on behalf of Robert and JoAnn Wollersheim of Wollersheim Winery near Prairie du Sac, Wisconsin concerning the proposed establishment of the "Lake Wisconsin Viticultural Area." This unique geographical region of Wisconsin holds historical winemaking significance for both Wisconsin and American winemaking.

The roots of Wisconsin and American winemaking can be traced to the first American vineyard of Agoston Haraszthy. Mr. Haraszthy, an early immigrant to Wisconsin, planted his first American vineyard in southcentral Wisconsin in 1847 in the region that is now the Wollersheim Winery. Soon after, he moved to California and forged his name permanently in American winemaking history. This early planting of wine grapes on the banks of the Wisconsin River provides a valuable and historical link between modern American winemaking and its early beginnings.

We who live in the "Lake Wisconsin" region share a strong fondness for the unique geography of this area of our state. The area is nestled in the Wisconsin River valley. The Wisconsin River is the largest inland river in Wisconsin and was forged by the receding ice of the last glacial period. Because of this, the area is filled with a variety of geographic structures, which include limestone outcroppings, natural lakes, sharp elevation changes, fertile soil, and deep valleys. The particular spot in which Wollersheim Winery is situated is uniquely surrounded by many of these geographic structures which results in a more moderate climate than the harsh weather for which Wisconsin is all too well known.

It is our hope the "Lake Wisconsin" region will be given strong consideration for designation as a viticultural area. This beautiful region is known throughout much of the Midwest because of its distinguishing geographical wonders. Coupled with its early winemaking heritage, geography and the quality of grapes grown there today, we think this region would make a valuable addition to the list of viticultural regions of the United States.
