Dear Sir or Madam,

This letter is in response to the proposed establishment of the "Seiad Valley" viticultural area in Siskiyou County, California. The proposed area consists mainly of privately-owned lands within the boundaries of the Klamath National Forest, though it also includes some National Forest lands within its perimeter as well.

We support the designation of Seiad Valley as a viticultural area. We are personally familiar with Mr. Brian Helsaple's vineyard at Seiad Valley, and concur in his assessment that the area is well suited to additional vineyards. The area proposed, including lands south of the Klamath River along Grider Creek, does comprise a distinctive zone with regard to geographical features, topography, soil, and climate.

Seiad Valley is one of many places that have suffered greatly from the decline of timber-related industries in the northwest. We believe its designation as a viticultural area would encourage agricultural productivity, as well as lay the groundwork for increased tourism in future years. This could provide badly needed economic stimulation to this attractive rural community.

Our only concern about a viticultural area regarded possible effects the designation would have on National Forest lands in and adjacent to the area, or on activities occurring on those lands. In a phone conversation earlier today, Ms. Marforie Ruhf of your office assured us that a viticultural area designation would have no effects whatever on these lands or activities.

It is thus our pleasure to support Mr. Helsaple and the community of Seiad Valley as they seek designation of the "Seiad Valley Viticultural Area."

The Siskiyou County Farm Bureau heartily endorses the petition to establish the Seiad Valley viticultural area in Siskiyou County.

According to "Gold Mining in Siskiyou County 1850-1900; Occassional Paper No. 2," written by Gary Stumpf and published by the Siskiyou County Historical Society in 1979, the original name for the area, "Sciad" is believed to be Yurok Indian for "far away land." This is a most apt description of this wonderfully unique area relative to the location of so many large viticultural areas of lower northern California.

Seiad Valley is the site of a moderate micro-climate surprisingly suited to the cultivation of wine grapes which has been created by the inter-play of river, orientation to sunlight and sheltering effect of high mountain ridges. It is truly ironic that the accumulation of cast off dredger tailings or "useless piles of rocks", a legacy of early gold miners in the area, now serve to retain the heat of sunlight, helping to warm the cold winter air and combat the erratic frosts that limit crop diversity elsewhere in the county.

The Siskiyou County Farm Bureau is encouraged with the demonstrated local success of the Seiad Valley Vineyards. We consider the Seiad Valley area as having the continued potential for production of a fine quality wine as special as the region where it is grown and well deserving of California's reputation for excellence in wines.

For the past several years I have had the pleasure of being acquainted with Brian J. Helsaple from Seiad Valley, California. He is one of those rare individuals who sees an opportunity for economic development in an area that is depressed in our county.

You no doubt are aware with the spotted owl issues which the National Forest and Siskiyou County face the timber industry is at an all time low, and we need to diversify into other areas to keep our economy strong.

After personally viewing the grape growing enterprise on old dredger tailings in Seiad Valley, it certainly lends itself to greater production.
