Dear Sir,

We have been purchasing Zinfandel grapes from the Fiddletown vineyard of Chester Eschen since the vintage of 1974.

We consider these grapes to be of excellent quality and clearly distinct in character from the Zinfandel we purchase in the neighboring "Shenandoah Valley of California".

Fiddletown is a very old grape growing area and we would highly recommend that it be granted an appellation.

I am enclosing several of the labels of the wine we have made from the area over the years.

74 Zinfandel, Fiddletown, bottled March 1976

In 1974, for the first time, we made Zinfandels from a number of old, non-irrigated vineyards in the Sierra foothills. This one came from Fiddletown, the old gold mining camp made famous by Bret Harte. The wine is big, with the varietal fruit typical of the region, complemented by the oak of small-cooperage aging. It should be enjoyable to try this summer, but will need several years to approach full potential. PD (1/76)

In the fine 1980 vintage we used only the grapes from the higher slopes of this old hill vineyard to make the Fiddle-town and put those from the lower slopes in our softer Amador. This wine shows more of the regional fruit than have past vintages and is somewhat less tannic. It should improve with two or three years in bottle although it seems soft enough for tasting this fall. PD (3/82)

This 57-year-old vineyard, that had dropped nearly 80% in yield by the last year of the drought, recovered fully in 1979. The individual berries were relatively large and, picked before they could overripen, produced an elegant firm wine that, for once, shows the fruit typical of the Sierra Foothills. As with most of our vintages from Fiddletown, it will need at least a year of bottle age to begin to open and another three or four to soften further. PD (3/81)

We have always felt that the lower the yield and the smaller the berry size, the more intense and interesting the wine. However, in the second year of the drought these old vines dropped 70% from their typical yield of two tons per acre and we learned that there are limits beyond which further stress has no positive effect. The wine is guite tannic and needs several years of bottle age to show its elegant claret qualities. PD (3/79)

the elegant claret style of the 1975. The grape tannin and the oak are quite evident but the fruit typical of the region comes through. This fine wine should be laid down for at least two years to show well and probably needs four or five years to develop fully. PD (1/78)

75 Zinfandel, Fiddletown, bottled September 1977 The cool growing season affected the grapes and our fermentation temperatures, which averaged 10°F lower than usual, and produced wines that are more elegant and less tannic than a warm year like 1974. The old vines on the outskirts of the gold rush camp of Fiddletown produced this excellent, claret-style Zinfandel. It should be enjoyable to taste by December, but really needs several years of bottle age.

Subject: Fiddletown Viticulture Area, Notice no. 456.

Dear Sir;

The purpose of this letter is to comment on whether the petitioned area could be reduced in size. Following a lengthy discussion at our most recent meeting of our Grape Growers Association, it was felt by the growers that the petitioned area remain as petitioned. We offer the following considerations for maintaining the proposed size.

- A. Proposed boundaries follow as much as possible naturally occuring geographic boundaries such as mountain regions, vally and streams.
- B. It is also felt that area has similar climatic conditions.
- C. While proposed area includes over 11,500 acres and contains only 310 acres of existing grapes, it is estimated that total acreage when developed will only be around 1,000. Although the area is large, much of the soil and land is not suitable because of extreme rugged terrain such as slopes facing poor directions. Grapes can only be grown on small hill tops with southern slopes. Thus, after carefully studying the area (including maps, walking some spots, and aircraft observation) we conclude that approximately 1000 acres are suitable for vineyard development.
- D. As there are already around 310 acres of grapes scattered throughout the proposed area and unlike some other Viticulture Region proposals that exclude some growers, we decided to include all those grape growers in the area that have similar climate and soil conditions.

As winemaker and winery manager for Santino Winery, I have used Zinfandel grapes from the Fiddletown area every year since the winery was bonded in 1979. The grapes from Chester Eschen's 60-year-old vineyards have produced our best and most expensive Zinfandel wines. Each vintage has come in with the sugar-acid balance conducive to producing some of the world's finest wines.

The name Fiddletown has been developed on the Santino Winery label, and the consumer has a strong acceptance of the Fiddletown name as being associated with the highest quality attainable in Zinfandel wine. We support the Fiddletown appellation so that we may continue using the name on future bottlings. We would suffer greatly in the marketplace if the Fiddletown name were to be missing from our label.

Dear BATF Representative:

We write in support of the petition of the Fiddletown Growers Association for a Fiddletown appelation. As an Amador County, California winery, we are especially well acquainted with the high quality grapes of the Fiddletown area. We have bought Fiddletown Zinfandel grapes during each year of our wine production and plan to continue to do so indefinitely. The Fiddletown growing region produces some of the best Zinfandel grapes in existence, and has achieved nationwide renoun. Our 1980 Fiddletown Zinfandel label bears the words "Fiddletown, Amador County Zinfandel". That designation brings a higher price and ensures rapid sales. Discerning Zinfandel wine buyers know the significance of the region. It is of the utmost importance to the wine industry and to wine consumers that this appellation be granted.

The Fiddletown region is one of the oldest premium grape growing areas in California. Some of its vines are over 100 years of age. It is largely responsible for the "discovery" of Zinfandel as a premium wine. Growers in Fiddletown have sold to Harbor and Sutter Home Wineries -- the first wineries to produce a premium Zinfandel from Amador County. More crucial to the reputation of the area, however, is the fact that it has provided Zinfandel to such prestigious wineries as Ridge, David Bruce, Carneros Creek, and Mondavi. The Ridge Fiddletown Zinfandel is known to many connoisseurs as the best Zinfandel in the world. The great fame of the Fiddletown Zinfandel is due to the fact that its Zinfandel grapes ripen with both a high sugar and high acid levels, making it a wine that lasts. A well-aged Fiddletown Zinfandel is second to none.

In addition to the approximately 160 acres of established vineyards in Fiddletown, there is much prime vineyard acreage that will no doubt be developed within the next few years. It is reasonable to assume that the Fiddletown region will contain at least 500 acres of Zinfandel within the next decade.

There is no doubt in our minds that the Fiddletown region qualifies as a distinct viticultural area, and that it is a viticultural area of such importance that it is crucial that it be granted the appellation of Fiddletown as requested. It would be a disservice to the discerning wine consumer to let this important wine region's name go into labeling obsolescence.
